
DIRECTIONS

- From Chepstow Castle turn left onto the bridge across 0 the Wye
- Turn left onto the path towards the bollards into Tutshill 0.6 0.9
- Turn left onto Coleford Rd / B4228
- Turn right onto Bishton Lane 1.2
- Follow the path onto the Wye Valley Greenway and turn 2.0 3.3 left under the bridge
- 5.5 8.8 At the end of the Greenway, continue onto the bridge into Tintern
- 5.6 8.0 Turn left onto the A466 then immediately right by The Wild Hare pub onto Forge Rd
- **11.4** Follow the road to the right \bigcirc Devauden 7.1
- 11.6 Turn left 🗭 The Fedw 7.3



Ride 1

A 35km loop from Chepstow to Tintern, taking in the Tidenham Tunnel and returning via the wooded hills on the west bank of the Wye

RIDE SUMMARY

Terrain: Quiet lanes with a 6km section on unsurfaced forest tracks, which can be muddy after rain.



The route begins by crossing from Wales into England on the **Old Wye Bridge**. The River Wye at Chepstow has the fastest rising tide in the world (over three vertical metres an hour) and the elegant cast iron span.

built in 1816, is the perfect vantage point to watch the waters ebb and flow.

It's onto roads through Tutshill towards the National Diving and Activity Centre, a scuba diving school that also has zip wires, bungee jumping and kayaking as well as glamping pods for overnight stays. The Centre stands at one end of the Wye



Valley Greenway, a new traffic-free cycling and walking route that uses the track bed of the old Wye Valley Railway. A highlight is the 1079m long Tidenham Tunnel, which is currently open from 1 April to 30 September in daylight hours only. At other times it is closed so as not to disturb the bats that roost and hibernate inside. There is low-level lighting – ride carefully while your eyes adjust to the darkness (bike lights are not permitted). When the tunnel is closed, there's a detour on lanes via Boughspring and the forest track through Boatwood Plantation.

After the tunnel, the route continues on unsurfaced forest tracks and back across the river into Wales at **Tintern**. The gothic grandeur of its huge ruined abbey, the swirling waters of



the Wye and sublime vistas framed by the steep cliffs of the gorge made Tintern a favourite location for poets and artists of the Romantic movement – and visitors taking the two-day Picturesque Wye Tour by boat from Ross to Chepstow. It remains popular with visitors to this day.

It's hard to imagine now, but Tintern once echoed to the roar of blast furnaces and the clang of forge hammers. The raw materials required by the early metal industry – iron ore, limestone, water power and timber to make charcoal – were plentiful in the surrounding landscape. By 1600 the wireworks at Tintern was the largest industrial enterprise in Wales.

A mile up the Angidy brook it's possible to explore the extensive and partly conserved remains of 17th century **Abbey Tintern Furnace**. It's then a long steady climb on ever-narrower lanes through the **Chepstow Park Wood**, once a hunting ground for the lords of Chepstow castle. In late spring the air is thick with the scent of wild garlic while in the autumn, the trees are ablaze with reds, golds and yellows.

The hill-top village of **Devauden** marks the end of the big climb. The effort of the climb is rewarded by a gloriously scenic few miles past panoramic viewpoints at Kilgwrrwg, Wern-y-Cwm, Newchurch and Earlswood.



National Cycle Route 42 leads back to Chepstow following the Mounton Brook, a tiny stream which once powered at least eight paper mills in the area.
